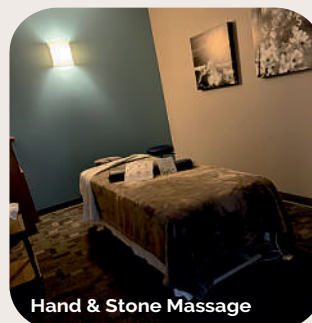

New, new-to-Chicago plays and musicals

Suburban and city theater fans looking for a new or a new-to-Chicago show have plenty to choose from this spring.

Besides the North American premiere of a jukebox tuner about British invasion stalwarts The Kinks, upcoming musicals include the Tony Award-winning "Titanic" by composer/lyricist Maury Yeston and writer Peter Stone and "Titanique," the hit off-Broadway parody of James Cameron's 1997 blockbuster.

The timely dramas "Prayer for the French Republic" addresses rising antisemitism in France during World War II and today and "Berlin" examines the rise of fascism in Weimar Germany.

And literary adaptations include regional premieres of the stage adaptation of the bestselling thriller "The Da Vinci Code" and Charles Dickens' literary classic about sacrifice and redemption, "A Tale of Two Cities."

With that in mind, here are a dozen (mostly new) shows for spring.

'Sunny Afternoon'

The story of The Kinks, a seminal band from the 1960s and the British invasion, inspired the jukebox tuner "Sunny Afternoon." Co-founder Ray Davies ("Lola," "You Really Got Me") came up with the story and Joe Penhall wrote the book. 'No Such Thing'

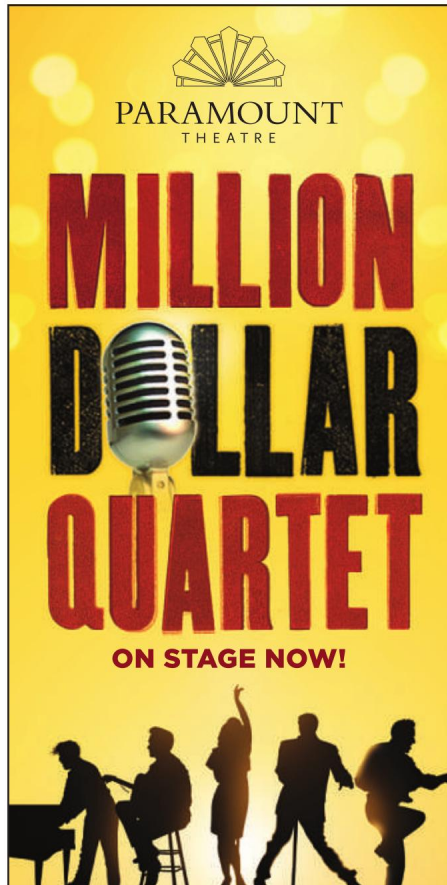

Collecting eggs from the chickens and putting out hay for the horses offers a taste of farm life with five different Animal Adventures at Primrose Farm, a facility of the St. Charles Park District.

The historic working farm is inviting guests to help feed, groom and care for its animals. Alison Jones, manager of farm programs and interpretive services, said these classes allow guests of all ages to enjoy animal experiences. Programs range from the simple task feeding chickens to learning farm skills.

A great introduction to the farm life is the Feed the Chickens and Feed the Goats programs. Jones explained that these two programs are popular for preschool-age children, and an adult can easily assist a child.

"Kids will marvel as the chickens flock to them for a treat," said Jones.

For the next level of adventure, try the Chicken and Egg activity where

home a share of the eggs collected for their own kitchen.

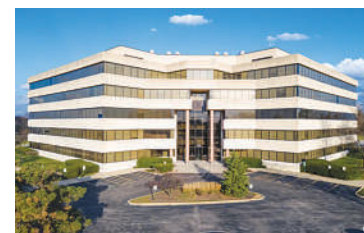
