

Dear Community Membe

Park Ridge-Niles District 64 seeks your thoughts and recommendations on a funding proposal that may be placed on this fall's ballot to protect and improve our aging school buildings.

The District's seven elementary and middle school buildings are 26 to 98 years old and face many age-related facility challenges.

Among the facility and site improvements District 64 seeks to address include

- Health, safety, and security upgrades, including updating fire alarms, performing asbestos abatement, replacing outdated interior and ancillary doors, improving fencing and railings, and enhancing air quality.
- Updating plumbing, electrical, and HVAC systems and other critical infrastructure
- Replacing aging roofing and exterior windows and repairing foundations
 and massage.
- Addressing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility code issues and other accessibility needs
- Updating classrooms, science labs, and career and technical education (CTE) spaces, including replacing outdated, inefficient lighting, aging flooring, ceilings, casework, and furniture
- Reconfiguring and improving band, choir, and orchestra rooms at the middle schools to allow for programming to be held during the school day, versus before and after school
- Constructing a new cafeteria/commons area at Lincoln Middle School to replace the current cafeteria, which does not have fire sprinklers and is located in the basement
- Reconfiguring and adding spaces to move student support services out of the hallways, where they are currently provided
- Adding space to reintegrate special education services

Each of District 64's schools would benefit, including Lincoln Middle School. This historic 98-year-old building would undergo major renovations to create healthier, safer, and more secure instructional spaces.

The proposed districtivide renovations and additions would ensure that every District 64 student and teacher has access to a safe and comfortable learning environment, enabling and promoting positive educational opportunities and experiences.

The estimated annual tax impact of the proposed \$98.36 million bond referendum is \$488 for a home with a fair market value of \$500,000 For homeowners who are eligible for the Senior Citizer bereption and/or other exemptions, the tax impact would be lower. Nothing is set in stone until we gather additional public input. The District will be hosting public information meetings and online webinars where you can learn more about the possible funding proposal and provide feedback. Possible 2024 Bond Referendum

Park Ridge-Niles School District 64 is considering placing a bond referendum on this fall's ballot to address our highest-priority capital facility needs. Among the districtwide improvements that would be addressed include:

- Health, safety, and security
 Lab and classroom updates
- · Mechanical and infrastructure
 - · Additional instructional

All seven District schools would be updated, including the historic 96-year-old Lincoln Middle School.

Focused on Preserving, Not Replacing

Not Replacing
The 2024 Proposal focuses on updates and renovations rather than demolition and replacement. Investing in what we already own, including three historically significant schools that are nearly a century old, is a more sustainable approach that would cost significantly less than rebuilding, saving taxpayer dollars.

Support Service Space Instructional space is so limited at District 64's elementary schools that special education and ELL programming is taking place in hallways. Reading and math interventionists, and other support professionals, are also using hallways when assisting students. It's often noisy, disruptive, and not conductive to learning. Given a lack of space at the middle schools, band, choir, and orchestra are held before and after school

If the 2024 Proposal is placed on the November 2024 ballot and approved by voters:

- Construction would begin as soon as the Summer of 2025.
- It is estimated that all the improvement could be completed within two years.
- · Much of the work would be addressed during the summer and after-school hours to limit disruptions.

Estimated Tax Impact

The Board of Education will make a final decision regarding placing a funding proposal on this fall's ballot in August, providing time for additional public input. *Includes Lincoln addition, allowing caleteria to be moved out of the basement that is not line sprinkfore




METHODOLOGY

Public Opinion Strategies is pleased to present the key findings of a survey conducted in Park Ridge-Niles SD 64. The survey was completed June 8-12, 2024, among 200 registered voters, and has a margin of error of <u>+</u>6.93%. Interviews were conducted via phone.

Jim Hobart was the primary researcher on this project. Torie Bolger was the project director and Colin McInroe provided analytical support.






The Ballot Measure

"Shall the Board of Education of Park Ridge-Niles Community Consolidated School District Number 64, Cook County, Illinois, alter, repair and equip existing buildings, build and equip additions thereto and improve school sites, including but not limited to improving safety and security; replacing roofs, plumbing, electrical systems, HVAC and air quality systems; updating classrooms and science labs; installing energyefficient improvements; increasing accessibility under the Americans with Disabilities Act; and adding space for special education; and issue bonds of said School District to the amount of \$98,360,000 for the purpose of paying the costs thereof?"



A slim majority of voters support the measure.






Democrats are the base of support for the referendum. Republicans are staunchly opposed.






Younger women are the most likely to support the referendum.






A quarter of voters are much less likely to vote for this proposal after learning about the tax increase.










Seven-in-ten voters give the school district an A or a B.






Voters see District 64 as better than other school districts.


A plurality of voters give District 64's facilities a B, but 30% don't know.







Voters are divided on whether District 64 is managing money wisely.






Funding Options

Basic safety and infrastructure upgrades are the most important funding options to voters.


Ranked by % Extremely Important




These funding options are not as important to voters.




The need for additional learning spaces is the most convincing message for the proposal.


Instructional space is so limited at District 64's elementary schools that special education and English language learning programming are taking place in hallways. Reading and math interventionists, and other support professionals, are also using hallways when assisting students. These renovations and additions would provide actual classroom space for these important programs.



Emergency infrastructure repairs to outdated HVAC, plumbing, electrical and air quality equipment can be very expensive and also disruptive to our students and teachers. Updating this equipment will reduce these types of costly emergency repairs and also make our schools more energy efficient.



It has been 27 years since district voters approved a bond referendum for capital improvements and the longer we wait to address facility needs, the higher the cost will be due to construction inflation. This is the right time to vote to improve our schools.






Concerningly, there are four opposition messages stronger than the second best message in support.
