



Theater forecast

City, suburban theaters showcase new works

Adventurous theatergoers eager for new works have a lot to look forward to come spring and summer, including world and regional premieres, two of which feature bona fide sitcom stars.

"Seinfeld's" Jason Alexander makes his Chicago stage debut in Chicago Shakespeare Theater's premiere of "Judgment Day" and longtime Steppenwolf Theatre ensemble member Laurie Metcalf returns to her theatrical home for the Chicago premiere of "Little Bear Ridge Road."

Listed below are a dozen shows for spring. If you can't wait that long, don't despair. Steppenwolf's blistering premiere of "Purpose," a family dramedy by two-time Pulitzer Prize finalist Branden Jacobs-Jenkins, runs through April 28.

Also in Chicago, the first locally made production of the jukebox tuner "Jersey Boys" is scheduled to run through July 28.

'Brooklyn Laundry'

Northlight Theatre participates in the rolling national premiere of "Brooklyn Laundry," John Patrick Shanley's new play that opened off-Broadway in February. The tale centers around the budding romance between perpetually single, cash-poor Fran (Cassidy Slaughter-Mason) and laundry owner Owen (Mark Montgomery). Artistic director BJ Jones directs. Check out these suburbs for great outdoor dining options

Spring has officially sprung.

You may or may not believe that depending on what day you're reading this, since it could just as easily be snowing outside as it could be 70 degrees and sunny. Either way, outdoor dining season is (or is almost)

Not much beats a nice meal outside on a nice day. And while COVID-19 wasn't good for much, it did encourage many local eateries to put a bigger emphasis on al fresco dining.

Some suburban towns even created outdoor dining zones during the seasonable months.

Arlington Heights introduced Arlington Alfresco during the summer of 2020 to provide outdoor dining during the pandemic. It's remained since, closing portions of Campbell Street and Vail Avenue to make more space for sidewalk tables at restaurants including Salsa 17, Mago Grill & Cantina, Peggy KInane's, Carlos and Carlos and more.

Arlington Alfresco is open May through September.


Similar to Arlington Alfresco, the Downtown Wheaton Association and the city created the Innovator Hale Street Tents al fresco dining zone in 2020. The stretch of pavement has since become a summer magnet and a festive scene, replete with white tents, landscaping and live music.

The monthslong event has become a community favorite featuring live music every Friday and Saturday night. Restaurants that participated in 2023 include Egg'lectic Café, Moveable Feast + Co., Gia Mia, Altiro Latin Fusion, Hale Street Cantina, The Burger Social and Ivy.

DuPage County has a robust outdoor dining scene outside of Wheaton as well.

The Naperville Convention and Visitors Bureau lists more than 50 restaurants with outdoor dining on their Dine Naperville page, including Meson Sabika, which last year was named among the top 100 most popular restaurants for outdoor dining in America by OpenTable.

The Spanish tapas-style restaurant was one of only three restaurants in



Diners have packed the outdoor spaces in the Arlington Alfresco zone the past several summers in downtown Arlington Heights.

Illinois to make the list, and the only one outside of Chicago.

In St. Charles, the city's First Street Plaza redevelopment created space for outdoor dining at spots like Alter Brewing & Kitchen, Gia Mia and more.

Downtown St. Charles was already replete with outdoor dining options like The Graceful Ordinary, The Filling Station Pub & Grill, The Office Dining & Spirits, Flagship on the Fox and others.

Further upstream in Algonquin, downtown restaurants and the village are working to return enhanced outdoor dining and live entertainment along Main Street for summer as they've had the last few years.

Algonquin eateries Cucina Bella, Cattleman's Burger and Brew, Whiskey and Wine and Bold American Fare recently requested village approval for loosened restrictions on outdoor dining for the season.

Be it a patio, rooftop or shared sidewalk, there are bound to be nearby restaurants where you can share great food and drinks outside with friends and family. Enjoy it while you can. It will be winter again before you know it.

'The Hot Wing King'







Here you can enjoy nature in a more peaceful and relaxing setting for activities like reading, drawing or meditation. If you're visiting with the family these preserves make a great place to enjoy trails perfect for running, and large fields for activities like frisbee and playing catch.


To begin day 2, enjoy the morning at Lord's Park. Here you can walk along the nature paths, visit the historic Lord Park pavilion and Lord's Park zoo to see the bison. There is also Wing Park which is a great fit for those looking for a more active way to begin the day. The sanctuary is dog-friendly and deeper ponds are available for fishing. There's also Bluff Springs Fen which is named for its type of fen where the spring water stays a constant 50 degrees causing the flourish of unique plants, endangered species, and other unusual fauna. For an extra interesting stop, walk through historic Bluff City Cemetery to see all kinds of markers dating back to the

Before hitting the road back home, grab a bite at a laid-back home-style restaurant like Ray's Family Restaurant or Walnut Speakeasy.

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



His goal is to create a photo archive of global diversity to inspire action through education, motivating people to help protect these animals for future generations. The award-winning photographer anticipates the completed project will encompass portraits of 20,000 species, including birds, fish, mammals, reptiles, amphibians and invertebrates.

The interest generated from the endowment will annually offer \$800,000 to support essential land management tasks. This funding will safeguard decades of investments, comprising both public and private funds, dedicated to the restoration of the forest preserves, said Preservation Foundation President Nels Leutwiler. "The endowment will also provide a steady source of matching funds necessary to secure outside grants and donations in order to advance future projects."

The National Geographic Photo Ark is a multiyear effort to raise awareness about endangered species and conservation efforts. Sartore's striking portraits of animals have drawn attention to the plight of many species facing extinction due to habitat loss, climate change and other human-induced factors.

Sartore was a newspaper photographer before focusing on wildlife photography. He often uses a simple black or white background in his portraits to focus the viewer's attention solely on the animal subject. His minimalist approach highlights the beauty and diversity of each species he photographs.

"As stewards of the environment,



See Fox Valley beauty aboard a paddlewheel riverboat


